PROGRAM NOTES

The melody of Ye Banks and Braes, written in 1788, is attributed to Charles Miller. The lyrics were added in 1792 by Scottish poet Robert Burns. The melancholy character of the melody matches the pastoral images and feelings of unrequited love as set by Burns. The word "brae" indicates a hill or hillside along a river.

NOTES TO THE CONDUCTOR

Ye Banks and Braes should be treated as a chorale and played broadly and gracefully unless otherwise indicated. Attention to dynamics and indicated ritards, etc., are critical to a successful performance. The conductor is encouraged to take advantage of the latitude of expression afforded in a chorale setting.
